The Laws of Life Essay Contest asks students in grades 9-12 to self-reflect and write about ethical principles that will help them develop leadership skills and their character. During the process, they will learn more about themselves and what they stand for after reading the *Uncommon*Sense® FRAMEWORK. Additionally, it gives teachers the opportunity to further know their students and encourage empathy and compassion.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

The Laws of Life Essay Contest is open to schools with students in **grades 9-12** throughout the following counties: **Ashland, Medina, Portage, Richland, Summit and Wayne**. Students can submit essays individually or with a class, school or other youth group.

BBB Akron sponsors this valuable experience for Ohio's youth because we believe that to have trustworthy businesses tomorrow, we must encourage strong character in our youth today.

IS THERE A SPECIFIC LENGTH?

Essays should be **500-1000 words** (2-3 pages), **typed**, **single-sided** and **double-spaced**.

HOW ARE THE ESSAYS JUDGED?

Essays are judged primarily on content. A sample judging rubric is provided on the website.

HOW DO I GET STARTED?

A local contest is as simple as one teacher and one class - or whatever works best for your community. All resources are available at BBB Akron's website.

Students may enter independently if their school does not offer it as an in-class assignment.

The Teacher's Guide has suggested lesson plans, essay prompts and recommendations on how to integrate this writing assignment within state and Common Core standards.

JUSTICE

High-character people uphold truth, expose error, and correct wrongs.

Just people are diligent in weighing evidence and seeking out the truth. They analyze and evaluate individuals and information. They protect the innocent but hold the guilty accountable. They strive not to be harsh, exasperating, or manipulative. Just people try to objectively determine what outcome, however difficult or painful, is right.

Observable virtues: impartial, unbiased, diligent, decisive

Typical examples include:

- Decisions that affect people are not made hastily; facts are gathered and thoroughly considered.
- Good behavior is rewarded as often as wrong behavior is confronted.
- People do not play favorites; all operate by the same rules and have the same opportunity.
- People do not intentionally use harsh or manipulative means to gain an advantage.
- When a wrong is committed, regardless of the outcome, the offender(s) is confronted with the wrong.

We ask students to reflect on what "JUSTICE" means to them, why it is an important Law of Life, how they learned this trait, and how they have changed their behavior to live up to that law. Below are some potentially helpful prompts:

- ✓ What does justice mean to you, personally? How do you define justice in your own life? Why do you think it is an important principle to live by?
- ✓ Describe a time when you stood up for what was right, even though it was difficult. What happened? What did you risk? How did you feel afterward?
- ✓ Write about a time when you witnessed someone being treated unfairly. How did you react and what did you learn from that experience?
- ✓ Who in your life has taught you the most about justice? This could be a family member, teacher, coach, friend or even a public figure. What lessons did they teach you?
- ✓ How is being "just" different from being "fair"? Reflect on whether these words are interchangeable. How does justice require more than just treating people equally?

Students are not required to write about this topic, however, the best essay on **JUSTICE** will be awarded **\$500**!

How does the Laws of Life Essay Contest fit into a standards-based curriculum?

While many states have their own standards for the English/Language Arts curriculum, most are consistent with national standards or the "Common Core". The Laws of Life Essay Contest complies with the Common Core, the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) for English/Language Arts, and the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) standards.
